We have entered into a time of reflection as we proceed with Jesus toward Jerusalem. Once more, we are on a collective journey of faith as we travel toward Holy Week and its culmination at Easter. As we proceed through Lent, each Sunday's theme will be about the many covenants God has with God's people.

Today we begin with all the candles in our Lenten wreath lit. The six purple candles signify the royal status that Jesus has within our hearts and our minds. Also, there is the Christ candle, signifying the light of Christ in our world.

Today we mark the journey by extinguishing our first candle, even as we remember God's covenant of promise, made through a wandering Aramean.
