We praise you for all your good gifts: the witness of saints and prophets; the work of faithful women and men; this earth in all its blessing and promise; and this bread, once scattered, now brought together and made one. In the hope that your people may be brought together from the ends of the earth into your reign of justice and compassion, we gather with those of every time and place to give you praise and glory:

As we gather at this table, we remember that on the night before he died, Jesus had supper with his friends. He took a loaf of bread, thanked you as we have thanked you, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Each time you do this, remember me." Then, he took a cup, and after giving thanks, passed it to his friends, saying: "Drink. This cup is the promise of God, made in my blood. Each time you drink from this cup, remember me." Eternal God, we unite in this covenant of faith, as we break bread and share the cup, giving thanks for your love in Jesus, the Christ. We spread your table with these gifts of the earth and of our labour. We present to you our very lives, committed to your service on behalf of all people. By what we do here, we proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Holy Spirit, as we offer the gifts of the bread and the cup for your blessing, so we present ourselves: our accomplishments, our failings, our hopes, our realities. Make us, while many, one. Make us, though broken, whole. Make is, despite death, alive. Make us weak, so we might rely on your strength; as we have heard the Word, may we listen to the cries of the poor; as we are family with those sitting beside us today, may we love our sisters and brothers in every corner of creation; as you hold out the bread and the cup to us, may we reach out to enemies to clasp hands as friends; as we acknowledge our limitations, make us bold to bring to you in prayer those things that are beyond us. We pray today especially for our brothers and sisters around the world, especially the people of Colombia, Ecuador, and Venezuela;

for those who mourn the loss of loved ones, especially the friends and family of Ken Pole; for those who are ill or dying, awaiting medical intervention or recovering from treatment, especially Annette, Arnold, Barb, Butch, Barb and Wally, Jack, Mary, Rob, and their loved ones, their caregivers and those known only in the silence of our own hearts...

Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor are yours, almighty God, now and forever. We continue praying the words Jesus taught us, saying,

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For yours is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.
